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# FINANCIAL AWARDS—HOW MUCH MONEY AM I *REALLY* GETTING?

The financial award letters are arriving daily in the mail and students are parents are confused by the jargon, stressed about the balance at the end of the page, and families are making decisions that will make an impact on the rest of their lives and the lives of the student.

First, do not feel rushed. Take your time and read the paperwork carefully. Call the financial aid officers with any questions. Most financial aid officers are very friendly and want to help families determine what is the most efficient way for a student to pay for college. Remember, this is a business and they want you on their campus.

Secondly, do not always look at what college gave you the most money. Also look at what is included in the college tuition. For example, some college provide laptops and other provide laundry services and yet others provide nothing but offer more money. It is important to look at the overall cost of going to college and not just the tuition. Items such as

gas and food if you are commuting or room and board if you are on campus are costs that each family must take into consideration before making the final decision.

Each family needs to sit down at the table, place each reward letter in front of them, and then place a college comparison checklist in front them and determine which school the best education option. Write down pros and cons for each school and make a list of items that you feel you will need that may cost additional money outside the tuitions. If you need additional college comparison checklists, they are available on the Guidance website.

School counselors and financial aid officers are here to help. We will have a meeting **Wednesday**, **April 3rd from 5-6 on financial award letters and answer questions.** This will be right before Parent University.

#### SENIOR CHECKLIST

- A Review your transcript and complete your credit check sheet.
- Communicate with your counselor if there are errors on your transcript or if you are not meeting graduation requirements.
- ♦ If you have decided on your COLLEGE, MILITARY BRANCH, or CAREER OPPORTUNITY, complete the blue form and return to the Guidance Office. More forms available in the Guidance Office. This information, along with your picture, will be posted in the Senior hallway.
- It is not too late to apply to college...many colleges are still accepting applications.
- ♦ If attending college, complete your FAFSA as soon as possible.
- ⋄ If you have been accepted to college, return to Naviance, click on "Colleges I am applying to" and edit your application from unknown to accepted.
  - If the college is requesting your "Mid-Year Report", please see your counselor.
     Acceptance into the college of your choice may depend on this report.
- Visit the Guidance Website for SCHOLARSHIPS...the list and applications are updated weekly.
  - ♦ Remember that it is OK to turn scholarships in EAR-LY!!
- ♦ Check out Career Postings on the Guidance Website, listed under "Career Resources" and "Employment".
